Reading: Poetry

Poetry: Poetry is a type of **literature**, or artistic **writing**, that tries to stir a reader's imagination or emotions. The poet does this by carefully choosing and arranging language for its meaning, sound, and rhythm. Some poems are simple and humorous and other poems are more serious and talk about life, tell a story, or to honor a person. There are MANY forms and styles of poetry.

Today we will look at **COUPLET**. In poetry, a **couplet** is a pair of lines in a verse that rhyme and have the same meter, or rhythm. They make up a unit or complete thought. We often find couplets in nursery rhymes.

Highway Heroes



We've been learning about how children travel on their Learning Highway towards their Learning Destinations. Some speed ahead and others go slow and steady – and arrive at the same destination; they're all Highway HEROES.



As children travel along the Learning Highway they need to keep their CPR Tanks full of confidence, persistence and resilience using The HIGHWAY TOOL of Supa Thinking. Another HIGHWAY TOOL is The Triple A's 4 Getting Things Done. The first A is **AVOID!**



Getting distracted is a HIGHWAY BUMP – and sometimes even a HIGHWAY HAZARD – if children don't get to their Learning Destination. How can children Avoid becoming distracted on their Learning Journeys?

The second A in The Triple A's 4 Getting Things Done is **APPROACH**. Sometimes children are asked to do work at school, homework after school and also some chores at home. Highway HEROES think about how to get the work, homework or chores done before starting to do them.

The HEN Strategy for Approaching a task is a HIGHWAY TOOL, and it helps you to decide **what to do first**.

TASK: Do you remember John and his messy bedroom from Week 6? Have a look at the mess in his room. John's Mum said his bedroom needs to be clean and tidy before he can play. It is very messy. John doesn't know what to do first.

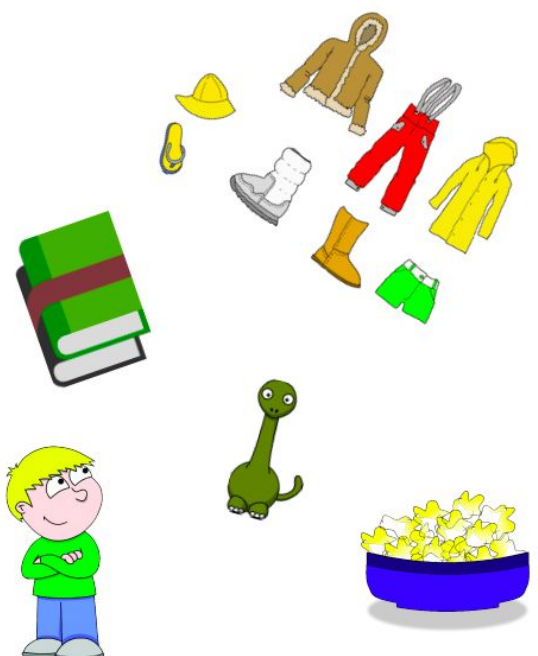

Reading: Poetry

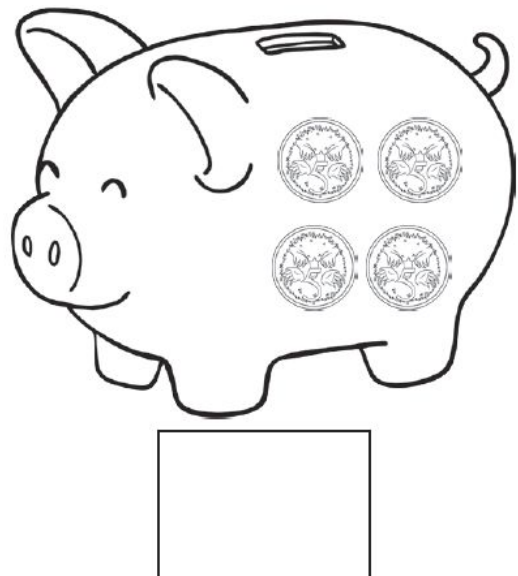

Read: Book of Genesis: Chapter 1

In the beginning there was no earth or sky or sea or animals. And then God spoke in the darkness: "Let there be light!" And right away there was light, scattering the darkness and showing the infinite space. "That's good!" said God. "From now on, when it's dark it will be 'night' and when it's light, it will be 'day'." The evening came and the night passed and then the light returned. **That was the first day.**

On the second day, God made the earth and over it He carefully hung a vast blue sky. He stood back and admired His creation. "That's good too!" said God and the second day was over.

The next morning God looked around and thought, "The earth needs to be a bit more organized." So, He put all the water in one place and all the dry land in another. When He had finished that, God made plants to cover the land. Dandelions and daffodils appeared. All sorts of trees and grasses began to grow. "It's looking great," said God and that was the end of the **third day.**

On the fourth day, God looked around and thought, "The daylight still needs a bit more work and the night is just too dark." 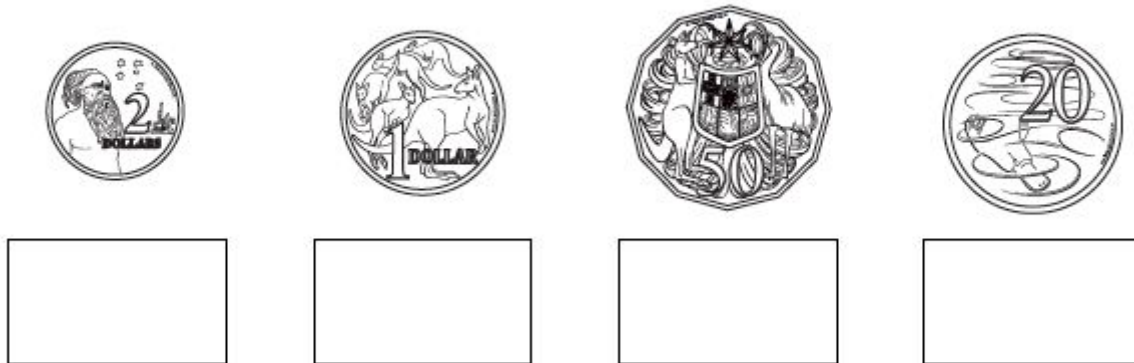
