#### **PARKING**

Please make sure that you obey the parking restrictions around the school, as there have been many complaints from parents/carers who have received parking fines. Please note that Brimbank Council are issuing these fines to people not obeying the law and not the school. Therefore, the school cannot cancel or pay for these fines.

Please ensure that you adhere to the following road rules:

- Do not leave your car unattended in the church driveway
- **Do not** block or park in neighbouring driveways
- Do not double park. Even if it is for a few seconds.
- Only those persons with DISABLED stickers are permitted to park in the disabled parking bays at front of school.
- Do not park on people's nature strips.


The parking situation around the school is not ideal. However, I have been liaising with Brimbank Council to come up with ways to improve the parking situation around the school.

#### SAFETY IN THE CARPARK

We have had reports that some of our parents/carers are blocking the driveway next to the church and that some people are parking their cars illegally. Please remember that we have young children who enter and leave the school from the gate next to the church (Gate 2). Cars should not be parked on the zebra crossing or left unattended in the church driveway. When this happens, it blocks the people behind you and as a result, the cars in Oleander Drive are at a standstill. Unfortunately, if this continues to happen, we will have close the driveway next to the church. The safety of our students and families comes first.

#### STUDENTS ARRIVING LATE EACH DAY

We have a number of students who are coming to school very late in the morning. If students arrive after 9:15am, they will need to obtain a late pass from the school office. Each time a student is issued with a late pass, it is recorded on the roll, which then appears on the student's report card each semester.





We have also come to realise that many of our students are going to bed very late at night. As a result, they struggle to get out of bed in the morning and come to school feeling tired. Please remember, if your child is tired then they will find it difficult to learn!

#### **RAPID ANTIGEN TESTS**

It is recommended that students and staff use the Rapid Antigen Tests at home twice a week (i.e. on Monday and Wednesday). Any positive test results need to be reported to the school. You do not need to inform the school of negative test results, only inform the school if your child receives a positive test result. Please remember, to collect your child's Rapid Antigen Test kit immediately from the office if you have not done so already.



#### IS YOUR CHILD UNWELL? IF YES...PLEASE KEEP THEM AT HOME!

Staff members and students must stay at home if they are unwell or if they may have been exposed to COVID-19. If a child stays at home because they are sick, this can prevent an entire class or the rest of the school having to quarantine.

**Please remember**, that your child should **not come to school** if they have a sore throat, a temperature, if they feel fatigued (tiredness), if they have a loss of taste or smell, tummy pains or shortness of breath. If the students show any of these symptoms whilst at school, they will be sent home immediately.

It is important that your emergency contact details are up to date. It is also essential that your emergency contact person is available if, for any reason you are unable to pick up your child if we ring you.

The constant message is for all of us to be responsible in the actions we take. By keeping yourself safe, you are keeping your families, your colleagues and your friends safe.

## CAMPS AND EXCURSIONS: - COVIDSAFE MEASURES

With the easing of restrictions, our students are now able to go on excursions and camps. However, we need to remember that COVID-19 still exists. Therefore, we still need to have a number of COVIDsafe measures in place to ensure all attendees are safe and so that our excursions and camp programs can continue. Some of these are outlined below:

#### **EXCURSIONS AND CAMPS**

- In planning for all non-classroom based activities and extra- curricular activities, including camps, excursions, other out-ofschool activities, incursions and learning activities such as sport (including swimming), music and the arts, schools must conduct a risk assessment.
- · Staff will also need to complete and submit the 'COVIDsafe Plan' to the principal prior to the activity.
- Students in Grades 3-6 will need to wear a facemask whilst travelling on the bus.

## **CAMPS**

- Prior to departure, student will need to have a Rapid Antigen Test and must produce evidence of a NEGATIVE result.
- Parents/Carers will need to give consent for a staff member from the school to administer a Rapid Antigen Test on their child, should they present with any FLU like symptoms whilst on camp (eg: runny nose, cough, sore throat etc.)
- If a child presents with any of the above symptoms, the child will be required to isolated immediately. The parent/carer will be contacted to pick up their child from the campsite as soon as practicable.

#### HISTORY OF HOLY EUCHARIST PARISH

Last Sunday, our parish celebrated 50 Years! Mass was celebrated in the Church by the Most Reverend Peter A Comensoli, Archbishop of Melbourne. We were also fortunate to have the Vicar, Fr John Hill, the Redemptorist Provincial, Fr John Hodgson, our past parish priests, Fr Peter Carrucan and Fr Tuan Anh Do and a number of visiting priests. The Archbishop mentioned online that our community is "a vibrant, multicultural, faith filled parish that's bursting at the seams!"

It was an honour and a privilege to deliver a speech on behalf of the parish, to thank the Archbishop, the visiting priests, and members of our community. During the speech, I spoke about our history and what we have accomplished together at Holy Eucharist, St Albans South. Please find the transcript below.

In 1971, Fr Anthony Guelen was appointed to start a new parish in the Western suburbs, of the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

Back then, Fr Guelen had a vision for Holy Eucharist.... Holy Eucharist was to be built for the future; to cater for the priests and people of St. Albans South in the 'tomorrow' years.

Ironically, I found a brochure from 1971, advertising Holy Eucharist. The title "Our Parish.... Today and Tomorrow..."

On 19th March 1972, Mass was celebrated at 9am for the first time at Holy Eucharist Church (which is now the parish hall). The Mass was offered for all the parishioners in the new parish. In April that year, Archbishop James Knox blessed the Church-Hall, the presbytery and the Religious Instruction centre which is now Holy Eucharist School.

In January 1973, Sister Eugenia, a Josephite nun from St. Joseph's Convent in St. Albans, was appointed as Religious-Coordinator for the parish. The new housing development in St Albans was increasing steadily and Religious Instruction for children in the State Schools became too much for Fr. Guelen to do it all by himself.

Sister Eugenia and Fr Guelen attended St. Albans Heights Primary School and St. Albans South Primary School to teach Religious Instruction. Together they took 13 classes each week at the state schools to teach the students and to prepare them to receive the sacraments.

On 21<sup>st</sup> Feb 1973, Cardinal Wojtyla presided at a Liturgical Function at the Sacred Heart Church in St Albans. The Cardinal met with the parishioners from Sacred Heart and Holy Eucharist. Back then, no one would have realised that Cardinal Wojtyla would later be the future Pope and Saint John Paul the second.

By 1974, St Albans South was growing rapidly. Many new European migrants and young families began to settle in St Albans South. There was now a need for a Catholic school in the area. In 1974, plans were drawn for Holy Eucharist school.

The Mercy nuns also moved into the convent in O'Brien Drive to assist. Sr Leonie Glennen, who was a former principal at St Brendan's in Flemington, was appointed principal. Sr Margaret Broadbent, Sr Margaret McHugh and Sr Helen Duffy taught at the school when it opened in 1975.

The parish continued to grow and flourish and so did the buildings. In 1978 stage 2 of the school which included a library was now completed. But it didn't stop there, a number of relocatable classrooms were needed to accommodate the growth.

In 1979, the Mercy sisters moved to other parishes and the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart arrived at Holy Eucharist to work in the parish and at the school.

Almost 10 years after the parish was established, Fr Guelen had appointed Max Chester in 1981, to draw up plans for a new church to be built on the corner of Oleander and Chedgey Drive.

Early in 1982, the parishioners gathered for the blessing of the new church site.

On Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> October 1982, the new church was blessed during Saturday night Mass, by Archbishop Frank Little.

Over time, our parish continued to grow and change. The needs of our community have also changed over time. However, we have been so fortunate over the years to have many parish priests to lead and guide us along the way: Fr Guelen moved to St Mary's Dandenong in 1984 and Fr Kevin Burke moved in. Fr Peter Carrucan arrived in 1992, Fr Minh Tran in 2010, Fr Tuan Anh Do in 2016 and Fr Vincent Pham in 2020.


When Fr Peter Carrucan arrived at Holy Eucharist in 1992, I can remember him saying, "if you want to see the world, come to Holy Eucharist". And it's true, we are so blessed to be part of a large parish, made up of many cultural groups and communities with different needs.

Our parish has always been a place of welcome and hospitality.

There are a number of groups within our parish which caters to the needs of the ever-changing community. The Senior's club, St Vincent DePaul and the Loaves and Fishes Foodbank are some remarkable examples of this.

Holy Eucharist Parish is undeniably a place where we live by our motto. We "Welcome the stranger" and "Feed the hungry". The Gospel values and our motto are reflected in our - every-day - parish life.

#### NAPLAN 2022

This year, the students in Years 3 and 5 will be taking part in the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) from 10<sup>th</sup> May – 20<sup>th</sup> May 2022.



NAPLAN is a nationwide measure through which parents, teachers, schools, education authorities, governments and the broader community can determine whether or not young Australians are developing the literacy and numeracy skills that provide the critical foundation for other learning and for their productive and rewarding participation in the community.

NAPLAN results allow parents/carers and educators to see how students are progressing in literacy and numeracy over time – individually, as part of their school community, and against national standards. The assessments are undertaken nationwide, every year, in the second full week in May.

NAPLAN is made up of tests in the four areas (or 'domains') of:

- Reading
- Writing
- Language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation)
- Numeracy.

#### **GRADE 5 CAMP**

The Grade 5 students had a wonderful time at Camp Gundiwindi in Silvan. The students were very fortunate to have lovely weather during their stay. They got to experience the Flying Fox, the Giant Swing, Indoor Archery, an evening camp fire, yabbying, farmyard and animal feeding, bush walking, Puffing Billy and much, much more.

#### LITERACY NEWS - CELEBRATING LEARNING (Writing in Prep)

The students in Prep have been learning how to spell using letters and sounds. The teachers introduce a "Word of the Week" each Monday. The students read, write, draw and experience all things about that word all week. The word is also taught to the students in the context of a sentence. This sentence is used for handwriting, sequencing, tracing, copying.

This week's word is "tap". The students are expected to say the sound and name of each letter in the word. In Prep CL, the students wrote their own sentences using the word "tap". Here are some amazing examples of the writing completed on Wednesday morning. Look at the handwriting and how they have had a go at spelling words on their own.

#### Writing in Year 6

Students in Year 6 have been working on improving simple or what they have called "sick" sentences. They have encouraged to use descriptive language to change the sentences. Following are a couple of great examples:

Musical World by Tra My 6JC

#### Sick Sentence

There is a big tree. It has big branches.

#### Improved sentence using descriptive language

On a sunny breezy day lies a family under an old ancient tree having a mini picnic filled with delicious food which filled the huge wooden picnic basket all the way to the top. The strong heavy branches with lush leaves hovered over the family. Around the trees small bunnies ran around chasing elegant and colourful butterflies. The beautiful flowers bloomed onto the green grass and made the surrounding area filled with a fresh aroma mixing with the warm scent of the food.

#### Sick sentence

Buildings go out of the guitar.

## Improved sentence using descriptive language

The tall building suddenly emerged from the enormous guitar that has been a part of the musical world for decades. The buildings were glistening in the sunshine and part of the building was covered with fluffy clouds. As I looked up into the sky, I saw birds freely soar by filling the atmosphere with a loud yet peaceful squawk.

#### A Musical World by Rachel 6JC

As I sit under a shady tree, yellow, red, orange, brown and pure golden Autumn leaves fall on my lap. I feel a soft, morning breeze on my face as I read my favourite novel. The glistening tree drops down many branches shaped as different musical notes. I could hear the sound of a harp, passing by as the wind travelled through my ears. I feel the silky smooth and delicate grass swift back and forth on my legs and hands. Well done Year 6. Keep up the great work. I certainly enjoyed reading the improved sentences.

#### This talk is all about the meaning of the story!

**Before reading** and **during reading**, ask your child to stop and make a **prediction** (e.g., what a character will do, how a character will react, how a situation will turn out).

After talking about the book, you can...

Read the book to your child

Or...Your child can read the book to you!

When your child makes a mistake, and it makes sense. Let your child continue.

For example, if your child reads Tom kicked the football over the fence.

#### Or...Read the book

- Together page by page aloud.
- Taking turns.
- Leaving out key words or repetitive words/phrases for your child to read.

Instead of....

Tom kicked the ball over the fence.

This error makes sense!

You don't always have to correct!

When your child makes a mistake, and it does not make sense...

let our child read to the <u>end of the sentence</u>. Do not interrupt your child mid-sentence! They may correct the error by themselves.

## REMEMBER that reading is all about getting MEANING from print.

The more you interrupt your child's flow of reading, the more likely they will lose this meaning!

If they don't correct themself, wait and ask -

Does that make sense? Ask your child to re-read the sentence.

If your child is unable to self-correct...
