We started the week with our School Review (VRQA and Child Safety Standards) and the Grade 4s attending camp at Sunnystones in Merrimu. The Grade 4 students and staff had an enjoyable time at their overnight camp. I was fortunate enough to join them on Tuesday evening for dinner and the campfire. The students sang songs led by Mr O'Bree and the rest of the teachers whilst roasting marshmallows over the embers. I would like to thank all the teachers who gave up their time to sleep-over and look after our students. I am sure the experience was very valuable for all concerned.

On Thursday last week, we also had our 'Turning of the Sod Ceremony' to mark the beginning of the construction of our new building. We also had other special visitors such as Mr Craig Carlan, Regional Consultant from Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools, Ms Mel Walton Senior Associate from MINX Architecture, Mr Adam Whelan from Gemcan Construct, Fr Vincent Pham our Parish Priest and members from the School Advisory Council, who joined in the celebration to mark the beginning of the project. Over the school holidays, the builders commenced work by preparing the site. They have placed temporary fencing around the perimeter of the new building site and have placed their meeting site cabins and amenities in the staff car park!

Next week, will be moving into the next phase of the School Review process. The reviewer will be onsite for 2 consecutive days and will be engaging with students, staff, parents and members of our school community, to establish clear improvement directions for the school. The reviewer will then examine the findings from the observations and interviews and will return later in November. During the next visit, the reviewer will present key findings/directions and recommendations which will assist in formulating our School Improvement Plan for the next 3 years.

TURNING OF THE SOD CEREMONY

The construction of a new, 2 storey learning centre was marked with a sod-turning ceremony on Thursday 6 October. State Member of Parliament, Ms Natalie Suleyman, Mr Craig Carlan, Regional Consultant from Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools, Ms Mel Walton Senior Associate from MINX Architecture, Mr Adam Whelan from Gemcan Construct, and Fr Vincent Pham the Parish Priest joined the Holy Eucharist School community last week to celebrate the beginning of the project. The \$4.7-million project will include 8 classrooms, maker spaces, a teacher planning room, a new toilet block, a PE storage room and a learning deck. Ms Suleyman congratulated the school community and said that she looks forward to working with us on future projects for our school

Back in January 2021, I wrote to our local MP, Ms Natalie Suleyman and to the Minister of Education, (who was Hon James Merlino at the time), asking them to support my application for our school to receive much needed funding for a new building. I had mentioned in both letters that our enrolments had grown from 372 students in 2015 to 535 students in 2022.

In August last year, I received a phone call from Ms Natalie Suleyman with some good news. She rang to tell me that our school was successful in our application to receive \$2 Million from the third round of the Non-Government Schools Capital Grant fund.

This money, together with the school's contribution will be put towards our new 2 storey building which will comprise of 8 classrooms, maker spaces, a teacher planning room, a new toilet block a PE storage room and a learning deck.

The breakdown of costs is as follows:

Schools Capital Grant:	\$2,000,000
School Cash Reserves:	\$1,400,000
CDF Loan (20 years):	\$1,300,000
TOTAL:	\$4,700,000

I would like to thank Ms Natalie Suleyman for her support with our successful application and to Mr James Merlino who granted this application whilst still in office. This news brought a much-needed smile to everyone in the Holy Eucharist community.

I would also like to acknowledge the guidance and support with this project from Mel Walton, Ms Yvonne Karnej and Mr Craig Carlan.

We look forward to a successful partnership with Gemcan Construct who are builders and seeing how this project will enhance the lives of the Holy Eucharist school community.

Holy Eucharist School is a school which operates with the consent of the Catholic Archbishop of Melbourne and is owned, operated and governed by Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools Ltd (MACSL).

Purpose

Holy Eucharist School is committed to ensuring a respectful learning environment that is safe, positive and supportive for all students, staff and visitors of the school.

It is the intention of Holy Eucharist School to provide clear guidelines to all parents and visitors regarding the conduct expected of them while on the school premises, engaging in school-related activities or representing the school. Parents/guardians/carers and visitors are expected to uphold the school's core values at all times.

Application

This Code of Conduct applies to all Holy Eucharist School parents, guardians, carers and visitors to the school. The application of this code is not limited to the school site and school hours. It extends to all activities and events that are school-related and when visiting or representing the school, including, without limitation, at all times when wearing the school uniform. The code also requires that parent/guardian/carer or visitor actions do not bring the school into disrepute at any time, regardless of whether the action occurs within or outside of school activities.

Basic Principles

This Code of Conduct is based on the following principles that everyone at Holy Eucharist School:

- has the right to be safe
- has the right to be treated with respect and be valued even in disagreement
- has the right to participate within a secure environment without interference, intimidation, harassment, bullying or discrimination
- is encouraged to be respectful, polite, courteous and considerate of others
- has the right to be supported and challenged as ongoing learners.

Expected Conduct and Bearing of all Parents/Guardians/Carers

It is expected that every parent/guardian/carer will:

- uphold the school's core beliefs and values
- behave in a manner that does not endanger the health, safety and wellbeing of themselves or others
- abide by all health and safety rules and procedures operating within the school and other locations at which they may visit while representing the school
- ensure that their actions do not bring the school into disrepute
- respect school staff and accept their authority and direction within the exercise of their duties at the school
- observe all school rules as required
- strictly adhere to the school's policies and procedures as required

It is very important that this letter is kept handy, as it details your child's scheduled pre-prep sessions, as well as Orientation Day. PARKING AROUND THE SCHOOL PREMISES

Please remember:

3. **DO NOT LEAVE YOUR CAR PARKED IN THE DRIVEWAY NEXT TO THE CHURCH TO PICK UP YOUR CHILD/REN!** When this happens, the people behind you become angry and frustrated because they are blocked and cannot leave.

The church driveway is a Kiss & Go Zone. This means:

- The Kiss and Go Zone is a **"NO PARKING"** area.
- The driver should **ALWAYS REMAIN IN THEIR VEHICLES**
- When you leave home, **ENSURE THAT YOUR CHILD IS SEATED WITH THEIR BAG.**
- Your child must **USE THE FOOTPATH SIDE** of the door when getting in and out of the car.
- The driver must **NEVER DOUBLE PARK.**
- You need to **USE THE PARKING BAY** if the Kiss & Go Zone is full or if you wish to get out of the car,
- You need to **USE THE ZEBRA CROSSING** to cross the driveway. We need to set good examples for our children.
- You **CANNOT BLOCK THE GATE!**

Brimbank Council are issuing fines to people who were not obeying the law. The school is not authorised to cancel your parking infringements and will not pay for these!!!

Please ensure that you adhere to the following road rules:

- **Do not** leave your car unattended in the church driveway
- **Do not** block or park in neighbouring driveways
- **Do not** double park. Even if it is for a few seconds.
- Only those persons with **DISABLED** stickers are permitted to park in the disabled parking bays at the front of the school.
- **Do not** park on people's nature strips.

COVID-19 UPDATES

The Victorian Government has announced the end of the pandemic declaration and associated pandemic orders. New settings will apply from 11.59 pm on Wednesday 12 October 2022.

Requirements for close contacts, like continually testing negative on a rapid antigen test (RAT), will become strong recommendations – joining the strong recommendation to wear a mask indoors, which will remain in place.

Changes to COVID-19 isolation requirements

It is strongly recommended that **students**:

- who test positive for COVID-19 should stay home and isolate for five days
- should not attend school after five days if still symptomatic
- who are symptomatic but have not tested positive should not attend school.

Where **students** become symptomatic at school, they should:

- be collected by their parents/carers
- undergo testing for COVID-19.

It is strongly recommended that **staff**:

- who test positive for COVID-19 should stay home and isolate for five days
- should not attend school after five days if still symptomatic
- who are symptomatic but have not tested positive should not attend school.

COVID-19 reporting requirements

The Department of Health recommends that a person who tests positive for COVID-19 should inform those with whom they have recently been in contact, including their workplace, school and household.

Schools are therefore asked to continue reporting positive COVID-19 cases to Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools (MACS). Schools no longer have to alert the community of any positive cases.

Face masks

Staff and students who wish to wear a face mask should be supported to do so, and schools should continue to make face masks available for staff, students and visitors.

The Department of Health recommends that masks should be worn by a person who is a close contact of someone who has tested positive for COVID-19 when leaving home.

Additionally, the department recommends that masks should be worn by a person who has COVID-19 for 10 days after a positive test when they need to leave home.

COVIDSafe Plans

Schools must keep their COVIDSafe Plan in place, which should be regularly reviewed and updated as required. Our COVIDSafe Plan is available on our school website

SCHOOL REVIEW

In Victoria, schools are reviewed to make sure they are meeting the minimum standards and other requirements for registration. The review is a requirement by the Victorian Registration and Qualifications Authority (VRQA). Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of Melbourne take part in the review process every 4 years. The School Review is used to support deep learning and ongoing monitoring of improvement throughout the four-year continuous improvement process within the School Improvement Framework.

School Review supports schools and the wider system to foster improvement in an ongoing and continuous way, as well as ensuring schools continue to meet external legislative and regulatory requirements.

School Review has two main dimensions – **Improvement** and **Compliance**.

Pupils at Holy Eucharist Primary School have taken a step closer to seeing their school expand after a turning-of-the-sod ceremony at the St Albans South site, on Thursday, October 6.

School principal Michael Bonnici said eight new classrooms, a staff planning room, a new toilet block, sport equipment room and a breakout room would be built as part of the \$4.7 million project.

"We're building to accommodate growth in student numbers," he said.

Mr Bonnici said the primary school had about 535 pupils and numbers were expected to increase to about 600 if it developed into a four-stream school.

He said the state government contributed \$2 million to the project whilst the school funded the rest.

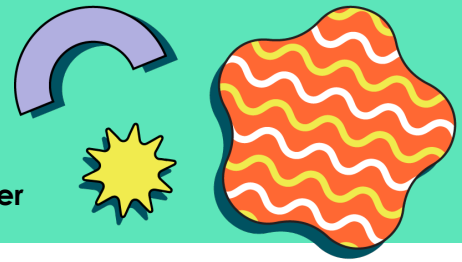
GRADE PREP EXCURSION TO THE ZOO

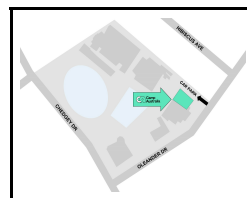
